**Readability**

This is an overall impression mark of the 'readability' of the candidate's work, i.e. is it difficult or easy to follow? Readability includes:

- General organisation of letter. The letter can be organised in several ways but should be easy to follow.
- The logical organisation of ideas. Are related or similar ideas grouped together logically and presented in a logical order?
- The appropriate use of paragraphing to help the reader follow the organisation.
- The appropriate use of signposts or cohesive devices to link ideas, showing, for example, contrast, similarity, continuation.
- The appropriate use of generality, specifics, and examples to effectively make points.

This is an overall impression mark of language used.

The 'language' mark is an overall assessment of vocabulary, spelling, grammatical accuracy, range and variety of structure used (for candidate's own language) and appropriate adaptation (for largely-copied language).
