Extract from the minutes of a Hong Kong College staff meeting

Minutes of the monthly staff meeting, Hong Kong College, 20 September, 2000

The Principal, Mr Philip Tong, expressed his wishes for closer ties with schools in China, particularly because of the return of Hong Kong to China in 1997.

The History Panel Chairperson, Mr Kent Wong, agreed and suggested that students might understand Chinese history better if they visited some of the areas in China which they were learning about and saw some historic and cultural sites.

The Putonghua Panel Chairperson, Mr Li Jiaxuan, added that educational trips to China could also help students with their oral skills in Putonghua. He pointed out that there were few native Putonghua speakers in our school and that practice with speakers from the mainland would help our students.

Much of the area around Yongfeng was badly affected by recent flooding and the money available for our school's English language programme has been reduced due to the need to finance urgent repairs to the school building. Our students now have very limited opportunities to practise the English that they learn in school. We would like to make contact with other schools to investigate ways to help our students to practise their English.

Extracts from travel guidebooks about China

Jiangxi is one of 21 provinces in China, and is situated north of Guangdong Province and south of the Yangtze River. It is 63,600 square miles (164,700 square kilometres) in area, with a population of 41 million people, many of whom live in rural areas. The capital is Nanchang. In the south of the province, people speak dialects closely related to Cantonese, whilst in the north they use Putonghua.

The name 'Jiangxi' means 'river west'. The province is surrounded by mountains and is crossed from south to north by the Gan River. The province also has the largest freshwater lake in China, Lake Poyang. Jiangxi is a subtropical region and has hot, humid summers but cold winters. It is a rich agricultural area, growing rice, sweet potatoes and many types of fruit as well as tea, cotton, tobacco, peanuts and soybeans.

The province contains many sites where key events in Chinese revolutionary history took place, including Jinggangshan, known as the 'Cradle of the Chinese Revolution', and Ruijin, the 'Red Capital'.

Jiangxi also has many sacred places including the Taoist shrine on Longhu Mountain, and famous scenic spots such as Lushan Mountain.

Over the past several years, parts of Jiangxi have been severely affected by the summer flooding of the Yangtze River. Many people have lost their homes and their crops, and this has affected all areas of daily life including education, as many schools were damaged in the floods.

Jiangxi Province has ancient bamboo forests, an extensive system of small farms, rare metal and mineral deposits, and abundant water resources. It is the birthplace of many cultural and religious leaders including the founder of Zen Buddhism, Liang Chieh. Liang and his followers built the famous Dong Shan Pu-Li Monastery in 857 A.D. during the Tang dynasty.

Students to Visit Jiangxi

Students from Hong Kong College in Kowloon Bay will be getting a taste of life on the mainland of China in March when they visit a secondary school in Yongfeng town, Jiangxi Province.

A team of students will be participating in Project Fan, which is described as an 'educational exchange'. They will learn about the culture and history of China and in return they will provide English conversation practice for the students of Yishan College in Yongfeng town.

Mr Kent Wong, a Hong Kong College history teacher involved in coordinating the project, says that this is the first educational trip to the province by a school from Hong Kong. 'From the beginning, one of the main aims of Project Fan has been to give our students the experience of travelling. That, in itself, is very educational.'

Miss Linda Stewart, an English teacher at the college, stated that another basic purpose of Project Fan was to expose students to the culture and lifestyle in places outside Hong Kong. She pointed out that students in Hong Kong lead very sheltered and quite privileged lives, with little knowledge of how people in other places live. She also said that the trip would serve as a team-building exercise to teach students how to work together.

Finance for the trip has come from a range of sponsors including local companies. Parents have also helped to collect money for the project, and some classes have held fund-raising events to purchase gifts to take to Yishan College.

If you would like to help, Hong Kong College is still looking for donations to support the project. The organisers of the trip particularly want stationery as they hope to establish a pen-friend network. They plan to make a gift of pens, paper and envelopes to Yishan College to encourage the students to write to students in Hong Kong.

A triumphant return home

Fifteen teenagers from Hong Kong College in Kowloon Bay returned home on Sunday after what one of them described as 'the trip of a lifetime'.

The students spent one week on an exchange programme with Yishan College in Jiangxi Province, PRC. The school they visited is much smaller than Hong Kong College. It has only ten teachers and gets virtually all of its students from the surrounding rural community. Most of the students live on small farms in the area.

Hong Kong College Form 6 student, Benjamin Tsui, originally scheduled to go on the trip, was there to greet his classmates when they returned to their college on Sunday night. Unfortunately, Benjamin had to drop out of the trip at the last minute because he broke his arm playing football the day before the group left for China. But he was enthusiastic about the prospect of going next year. 'I've always dreamed of going to Jiangxi,' he said.

HK College teachers Mr Kent Wong and Miss Linda Stewart accompanied the students on their trip to the PRC. Mr Wong explained that a key goal of the programme, called Project Fan, was to develop a sense of identity with China among the students. 'Hong Kong kids need to experience Mainland China first-hand and to learn to feel a part of it,' he said.



Excerpts from Miss Stewart's daily notes about Project Fan, with written comments from the principal, Mr Tong

Joey: As you will remember, I made notes every evening to go over the events of the day. Mr Tong has added his comments in the margin.

One hour late arriving in Yongfeng. Students very tired because we all had to stand on the Sunday 11 March train for the journey from Nanchang to Yongfeng. Many were also very hungry - not enough food with them for such a long journey. Hostel seems OK. First look at town and school today. Everyone friendly and helpful. City tour in the Monday 12 March morning, with English-speaking guide - interesting. Students say they slept badly last night - were tired today. Conversation practice classes today went reasonably well. I think they would be more successful if each class had six Tuesday 13 March Yishan students maximum. Students said that they did not want to plant rice in heavy rain. Some students suggested coming in summer next time, but from June to September many of the Yishan students are Wednesday 14 March absent from school helping with the rice harvest. Mr Wong asked the Principal, Mrs Liu, if we could take Yishan students with us on field trips to give our students more Putonghua practice, but Yishan students have other studies to do in the afternoons. Two students were sick today. Luckily two others agreed to take their places in the rice field. Sick students could not join field trip to Jinggangshan, so Mr Wong stayed behind in Thursday 15 March hostel with them. Still some problems with the English conversation classes - it is very hard work for our students. Rice planting is finished. Field trip to Ruijin. Unfortunately, the trip was so long that we got back to school very late and there was no time to prepare for tomorrow's concert. Jian Friday 16 March would have been a closer place to visit, but it is not so important historically. It's hard to believe our visit to Yongfeng is nearly over; a two-week visit would be better. Special concert - all HK students had to show what they had learnt - a dance, a song in Putonghua, or play some music. And Yishan students sang songs and did a play in English. We had a party in the evening with disco. All students said it was a great finish to an Saturday 17 March excellent week. Mr Wong and I knew that Project Fan would be beneficial to our students but what we hadn't realised was how much we teachers would learn about our students as individuals.

Excerpt from Joey Tang's journal

Wednesday 1 4 March 2001

We are having English conversation classes every morning with the students from Yishan College, and we also use English for all the other things we do until after lunch. We Hong Kong College students are supposed to be in charge of the conversation classes, but we have difficulty managing them because each class is so big. Smaller classes would be much better.

After lunch we change to using Putonghua all afternoon until after dinner. My Putonghua is not very good so I'd like the chance to speak more, and I think we need to organise our Putonghua practice a bit better. When the teachers are not around we always speak Cantonese. The other HKC students agree - we are not getting enough Putonghua practice.

Every afternoon we have a lecture about history. We have suggested to Mr Wong that next year before the students come to Jiangxi they should have special background history lessons at Hong Kong College to prepare them. But Mr Wong says that it would be very difficult to find time for these 'extra' lessons because all our history lessons are already planned to prepare us for our examinations.

Staying here has made me realise how interesting life is in the countryside. I always thought I could only live in a city. Now that I have seen how these people live, I've decided that I would like to live in a rural community and, perhaps, to be a teacher in future, which is something I never thought I wanted to be. The trip has certainly been beneficial to me in that it has made me more open to new ideas and possibilities.

Transcript of a radio interview about Project Fan

Interviewer: Today we have with us one teacher and three students from Hong Kong College in Kowloon

Bay, who recently returned from a trip to the mainland as part of Project Fan. Mr Kent Wong, Candy Chan, Andy Yeung and Joey Tang, welcome to 'This is Hong Kong'. First of

all, can you tell me about the name of the project – why 'Fan'?

Mr Wong: As you know, 'fan' means rice in Chinese! It was our principal, Mr Tong, who thought of

the name. We read about Yishan College in a magazine for teachers, and decided to organise the project. One of the aims of our visit was to learn about rice-growing, so while we were

there we planted a small rice field in the school grounds.

Interviewer: I see. Why the interest in rice?

Joey: Well, rice is very important in all Asian societies. And, the growth of the rice represents the

growth of our friendship with the people and the understanding of how they live.

Interviewer: That's a nice idea. What else did the Hong Kong College students learn, apart from how to

plant rice?

Candy: We learnt a lot about how other people live. It was so different from Hong Kong – the

language, the music, the food. I think it made us understand that there are many different

lifestyles even within China.

Joey: We also learnt a lot about Chinese history and culture – Mr Tong chose Yishan College

partly because Jiangxi is important in Chinese history. And for me, running the English conversation classes for the Yishan students was very challenging. I was surprised how

much it helped me; it built up my confidence and I learned how to be independent.

Interviewer: How about the question of language – was that a problem?

Andy: Well, we did practise some Putonghua while we were there, but actually we spoke Cantonese

or English most of the time.

Interviewer: Did you have any problems or bad experiences?

Candy: Well, the hostel we stayed in wasn't very good – the rooms were very uncomfortable and

cold.

Mr Wong: Yes, but there are only a few hotels in the area and they are all very far away from Yishan

College.

Andy: And, another problem was that some people got sick because they were caught in a really

heavy rainstorm when they were planting rice. The weather was quite bad and we had to

cancel some activities.

Interviewer: That's too bad. Now, another thing. What about group spirit? Did your group get on well

together?

Candy: Yes. In fact, we were amazed that we even developed new friendships with other Hong

Kong College students who we hadn't really known very well before. That was a terrific plus

for us.

Interviewer: What happens next, now that the project is finished?

Andy: Yishan College will be sending a group of students to Hong Kong in October and Hong

Kong College students will go back to Jiangxi next year. We hope the exchange can go on

every year.

Joey: Yes, we'd all like to be involved again!

Matters arising

Project Fan

Mr Tong reported that students and teachers had just returned from the Project Fan visit, and that Mr Wong and Miss Stewart, the team leaders for the project, would be providing a full report at the next staff meeting. Mr Tong said the school as a whole had reaped several important and unanticipated benefits in addition to specific gains made by participating students. For example, the publicity the project received had led to an improvement of the school's image within the local community.

Another unexpected benefit of your visit is that the Yongfeng people now have a greater interest in school activities and there is a much stronger community spirit.


The rice is growing fast. We will, of course, be bringing you a sample to taste when we come to Hong Kong in October, 2001.
