The Hong Kong pop scene has been enriched with the emergence of a new and exciting pop group that perfectly matches Hong Kong's youthful, multicultural flavour.

The group is called 'The Image' and was formed over a year ago when the members were still at school. Part of the original group is Liz Walker, who sings as well as plays the lead guitar. 'A few of us used to get together after school and play just for fun and it grew from there,' said Liz.

Their present lead singer, Paul Lau, joined them in autumn 1998. 'I was born in Canada and I came to Hong Kong with my family last year,' Paul told us.

'A friend told me about this group that was about to break up because they'd lost their lead singer so I persuaded them to keep going. We soon had a regular gig at "On the Edge" club, where we play every Saturday night,' said Paul.

'My style of singing is different from the previous lead singer, Mandy Lo,' added Paul. 'We now play mainly rock and roll music, though we still like to play the occasional quieter love songs. And I'm the songwriter.'


When you look at the background of the rest of the



Our band, 'The Image', is a local pop band which was formed about two and a half years ago in January 1998. All our members were studying at the Pan-Asian International School when the group was formed. We have an international flavour since our members are from different parts of the world - Liz Walker, the singer and the guitar player, comes from America; Anna Kwee, the bass guitar player, comes from Indonesia; Jonny Lim, the drummer, comes from Singapore; while our lead singer, as well as our songwriter, Paul Lau, who joined us about two year ago in autumn 1998, comes from Canada.

Our history can be divided into two parts. The first part is when we were at school. Mandy Lo was our lead singer at that time. The main type of music that we performed back then was slower, more romantic numbers, which suits her voice very well. We made our debut at school in a Chinese New Year concert in 1998, while our second performance was the farewell concert at school, in which we won The Best Performance Award, as well as compliments saying that we are a 'truly professional' group.

The second part of our history started after we left school. Mandy left us for Canada to further her study after her graduation, and Paul joined to take over Mandy's position. We then decided to play more rock and roll now, yet we still play quieter love songs occasionally. We won a talent competition in a TV programme called 'Hong Kong Talent Spotters' on 16th April, 1999. Same year, on 5th June, we had the opportunity to perform with the internationally famous Irish rockers, 'The Hot Metal Band' at the Hong Kong Coliseum. And right now our band has regular performance in a local club 'On the Edge' on Hong Kong Island every Saturday night from 9pm to mid-night, which attracts large number of audiences. With our growing popularity, we now have a growing fan club and have been interviewed and reported by magazines like the Music Magazine.

In the coming 2000 Hong Kong Youth Arts Festival, we will have another large public appearance, and it is going to be another sensational performance of our group.
